 Meeting national curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety. All pupils at TWOA are working significantly below age-related expectations in all curriculum areas. All pupils therefore follow personalised programmes of study and work towards personalized swimming goals. Our intended offer is for 100% of our primary pupils to have access to a weekly swim session or, for our youngest pupils, a weekly swim session on a half-termly rota'd basis. Pupils access instruction on water safety in ways relevant to their level of understanding in PSHE and PE lessons. 	£10,803 (50% of salary of addition support staff member) Funding used to maintain high levels of staffing necessary for pupils (many of whom have complex physical and medical needs) to access swimming sessions
